MISSION TRIP REFLECTIONS

It is nearly a week since we pulled into the parking lot at 10:00 pm after a week-long trip to Heifer Ranch in Perryville, Arkansas. Many of you who attended worship on June 11 got a taste of what our young people learned. If you missed worship I encourage you talk to one or all of them about their experience. It will change your life.

My time with them was certainly life-changing for many reasons. The first reason is that I was reminded that our future, as a congregation, as a nation, as a world is in wonderful, capable, compassionate and smart hands. The group of young people we took did not need the facilitators at Heifer to explain to them that our world's resources are not divided fairly; they already knew that. However, then we spent twelve hours in the Global Village. Global Village participants experience some of the daily struggles people in poverty face every day. Participants are randomly assigned to a village site representing areas such as Zambia, Thailand or Appalachia. Each family is given limited resources for their evening meal. Before they can eat, they may need to acquire resources from other families in the village, build a fire as well as cook their own meal. It is hoped that participants gain a deeper understanding of the struggles faced by people around the world. Our young people were transformed by the experience. They began to understand that our world will only change when we stop and recognize that there are people all over the world that do not have some of the privileges we have, and the only way change can take place is if we view the world from someone else's perspective.

Our young people spent time taking care of God's creation, which at Heifer took the form of GOATS, llamas, chickens, ducks, bees, TURKEYS, jungle fowl, pigs, cows, the list goes on. I emphasized goats and turkeys as these two seemed to be favorites of ours. I think nearly everyone enjoyed milking the goats and feeding the baby goats. Ask Olivia about milking; she will fill you in. Eva and Natalie got very personal with a goat. I will let them tell you all about that experience. On Sunday the eleventh, Natalie shared a bit about the turkeys and encouraged us all to be a bit more like a turkey when it comes to church – it was a great reflection; ask her about it. Spending time caring for these animals and being reminded of how they provide resources for us was extremely gratifying.

Our group also spent time working in the fields. Perryville is in one of the poorest counties in Arkansas, and the vegetable and fruit that we helped plant, weed, and harvest is used to alleviate hunger. We began to understand in new ways the interconnectedness of the world around us. What we grow, eat, and throw away has an effect on people all around the world. Heifer believes that there is enough for everyone IF everyone would use their resources wisely and fairly and then share those resources with others.

I said it on Sunday and I will say it again: our young people are gifts to us from God; they hold the future of this church and the world in their very capable hands. We adults would do well to LISTEN to them and learn from them. An ancient Native American Proverb sums it up well:

*Treat the earth well: it was not given to you by your parents,
it was loaned to you by your children.
We do not inherit the Earth from our Ancestors,
we borrow it from our Children.*

The same should be said for our church, our government, our nation and our world.

While most of the resettlement of the family has been completed, the RRR committee is still active in the mentoring program.
